

CMI Prerequisites

- 1) Minimum Age: All candidates must submit proof of being at least 18 years old (the age of majority as defined by the federal government). A driver's license or a birth certificate or passport copy are acceptable proofs of age.
- **2) General Education:** All candidates must submit proof of having at least a high school education level. A high school diploma, a GED, or any degree from an institution of higher education are acceptable proofs of general education.
- 3) **Profile Photo:** All candidates must upload a recent professional photo of themselves to their NBCMI profile.
- **4) Medical Interpreter Education:** All candidates must submit proof of training specific to *medical interpreting*. You must submit either:
- A Certificate of Completion from an approved medical interpreter training course of at least 40 hours.
- A transcript from a college or university where you took at least 3 credit hours of medical interpreting coursework.

A registry of some of the approved training programs is posted on the IMIA and CHIA web site: (this is not a complete list as there are many other programs not listed in the registry that are acceptable, please check with the program you choose to ensure it meets the medical interpreter training requirements)

Note: The interpreter training required for admission to the CMI program is training in medical interpreting. That requirement cannot be waived for anyone, regardless of how much other training and experience they have. Even doctors have the same prerequisite requirements as all other candidates.

5) Oral proficiency in English:

One of the following:

 Bachelor's, Master's, PhD, or any other degree from an institution of higher education in the U.S. or other English language country.

- High school diploma from a high school in the U.S. or other English language country or from an American School abroad.
- One of the following tests (subject to change):
 - TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language): 570+ on paper; 230+ on computer version; 90+ on iBT.
 - o ELPT (English Language Proficiency Test): 950+
 - o MELAB (Michigan English Language Assessment Battery) 80+
 - o ECPE (Examination for the Certificate of Proficiency in English): PASS
 - o FCE (First Certificate in English, Level 3): A
 - o CAE (Certificate in Advanced English, Level 4): B
 - o CPE (Certificate of Proficiency in English, Level 5): B
 - o IELTS (International English Language Testing System) 7.0

6) Oral proficiency in your spoken language:

One of the following:

- Bachelor's, Master's, PhD, or any other degree from an institution of higher education where your spoken language is spoken.
- High school diploma from a high school in a country where your spoken language is spoken
- 24+ semester college credit hours of your spoken language
- ACTFL Oral Exams (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages): Advanced Mid Level (follow this link <u>www.languagetesting.com</u>) - both the OPI (telephonic) and OPIc (computer recording) are acceptable.
